



Facts About the Water Cycle

The water you drank today may have fallen from the sky recently, but it is not new. That water has likely existed for as long as the earth has. It may be the same water a dinosaur drank millions of years ago. Or it may be the water that the explorer Marco Polo sailed on in the 1200s.

The earth has a limited amount of water. The same water keeps moving around again and again in an endless cycle called the "water cycle." It is the cycle water takes as it travels from the land to the sky and back again to the land. These are the stages of the water cycle.





Evaporation:

Evaporation happens when the sun heats the water in rivers, lakes, and oceans and changes the liquid water into vapor. This vapor rises up to the sky.

Condensation:

Condensation happens when the vapor that rose up to the sky cools and returns to a liquid state. The droplets of water form clouds.

Precipitation:

When enough droplets combine and they are heavy enough to fall, they return to earth as rain, or if they freeze, snow.

Collection:

This water that falls back down to earth gets collected by bodies of water like oceans, lakes, and rivers.
When it falls on the ground, it soaks into the earth and becomes water that plants and animals drink. Then the cycle begins again!
